Sec. 2.31 Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee (IACUC)

(e) A proposal to conduct an activity involving animals, or to make a significant change in an ongoing activity involving animals, must contain the following:

(2) A rationale for involving animals, and for the appropriateness of the species and numbers of animals to be used.

The IACUC approved protocol contained inadequate rationales explaining the appropriateness of the total number of animals being used for activities described in the protocol. The protocol states the approximate number of each species to be used for the activity and estimates a range of one to 20 rabbits needed to produce each immunogen. It does not, however, describe why the total numbers of each species were appropriate for the approved activity.

It is the responsibility of the IACUC to ensure that proposals to conduct activities as well as proposed significant changes in ongoing activities involving animals contain rationales that explain the appropriateness of the numbers of animals to be used in those activities.

ATTENDING VETERINARIAN AND ADEQUATE VETERINARY CARE.

Sec. 2.33 Attending veterinarian and adequate veterinary care.

(b) Each research facility shall establish and maintain programs of adequate veterinary care that include:

(3) Daily observation of all animals to assess their health and well-being; Provided, however, That daily observation of animals may be accomplished by someone other than the attending veterinarian; and Provided, further, That a mechanism of direct and frequent communication is required so that timely and accurate information on problems of animal health, behavior, and well-being is conveyed to the attending veterinarian.

One bovine appeared to have loose stools at the time of the inspection. Bovine #0122 had what appeared to be fecal material adhered to the coat from the base of the tail to the fetlocks of the hind legs. The coat appeared otherwise to be clean. There were no records of daily observation kept on the bovine subjects and staff members were unaware of the loose stools until the cattle were moved in from a large pasture to allow access for inspection.

Appropriate documentation is necessary to ensure that the animals at the facility receive adequate veterinary care. A system should be in place to ensure that diseases and injuries as well as their treatments are documented and that the animals receive timely and appropriate veterinary care.
