the IACUC shall determine that the proposed activities or significant changes in ongoing activities meet the following requiremer
(ii) The principal investigator has considered alternatives to procedures that may cause more than momentary or slight pain or
distress to the animals, and has provided a written narrative description of the methods and sources, e. g., the Animal Welfare
Information Center, used to determine that alternatives were not available;

***There was not an adequate alternative search done for protocol involving pigs. Narrative should include a
literature search with keywords used, databases searched, and period covered by search. Since there are some alternatives
available to this teaching procedure, narrative should include justification as to why they were not used. (Copy of policy 12 left with
facility). Correct by March 1, 2007.

The IACUC shall conduct continuing reviews of activities covered by this subchapter at appropriate intervals as determined by the
IACUC, but not less than annually;


***Annual reviews for standard teaching protocols involving routine handling of animals were not present. Need to ensure that all
protocols are reviewed at least annually. Correct by March 1, 2007.

(e) A proposal to conduct an activity involving animals, or to make a significant change in an ongoing activity involving animals, must
contain the following:

- (1) Identification of the species and the approximate number of animals to be used;
- (2) A rationale for involving animals, and for the appropriateness of the species and numbers of animals to be used;
- (3) A complete description of the proposed use of the animals;

***Some teaching protocols did not identify the approximate numbers of animals to be used, nor did they provide an adequate
rationale for the numbers to be used. At a minimum, number of animals to be used per student or group should be described and
justified.

***One teaching protocol involving gerbils did not include a description of euthanasia, nor describe the method used. Protocols
must include complete description of all procedures to be done, including euthanasia.
Correct by March 1, 2007.
